LETTER FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

2014 TLA Results Look Like a Race We are Winning

(As if you weren't already tired of election races and results)

So here I am again, sitting at my desk, looking out my window at the last gasps of autumn color, and trying to figure out what to send along to you in my 2014 year-end TLA Newsletter letter. This task gets more and more difficult every time I do it. It's not because the subject matter is difficult, because it's been the same for many years. Really, it's because it's so similar year to year that coming up with new perspectives has just gotten harder and harder. There is one thing that is different this year than in the past few years. It's an election year! So with that in mind, I've decided to give you my report of our progress in the form of an election year ballot. (a completed ballot because it is almost a completed year) So here is the ballot: (Yea for true, or Nay for false)

CHEMICAL TREATMENT RACE:

QUESTION 1:

Within the 40.6 acres of Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM) treated in the spring of 2014, 70% of the treated areas sample points were totally devoid of Eurasian Water Milfoil eight weeks following the treatment.

Yea Nay

QUESTION 2:

Within the remaining 30% of the treated area samples, the plant density of the Eurasian Water Milfoil plants was greatly reduced (like by 50%+).

Yea Nay

QUESTION 3:

This is the third straight year of really significant success in reducing both EWM geographic surface area and plant density in the treated areas.

Heavy Infestation Sites of Eurasian Water Milfoil Continue to Decrease

The results of our fall survey of Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM) in the Tomahawk Lake Watershed indicate that our two-tiered approach—chemical and manual treatment—to controlling this aggressive aquatic invasive species seems to be working. After the survey work was completed in September, a total of 14 sites, composing a total of 9.39 acres were chosen to be included in the 2015 Spring Chemical Treatment of EWM. A comparison with recent treatment years is noted below:

	2012	2013	2014	2015
# of Polygons	57	20	43	14

The most important elements which are considered in choosing a site for chemical treatment are the size of the site, and most importantly, the EWM plant density within the site. What this year's survey results show is that the number of locations that have EWM at sufficient plant density have been decreasing each year, and that those sites which qualify from a density standpoint are growing smaller each year.

HYDRAULIC CONVEYOR RACE:

QUESTION 1:

In 2014, the Hydraulic Conveyor System (HCS) removed over 20,679 pounds of Eurasian Water Milfoil from a total of 149 sites in the Tomahawk Lake Watershed.

Yea Nay

QUESTION 2:

The size of the typical HCS harvesting sites continue to grow smaller and less dense, indicating that we are catching newly infested areas earlier in their development, before they have had the chance to grow into "problem areas."

QUESTION 3:

Taken with the successes of our Chemical Treatments and our HCS Program, the future outlook for controlling and reducing EWM in the Tomahawk Lake Watershed appears to be bright indeed!

SOUTHERN NAIAD RACE:

QUESTION 1:

The Southern Naiad infestation in Thoroughfare Bay did not develop as in the past three years. While still present throughout the bay, the plant's growth pattern exhibited virtually no growth upward in the water column, leaving the bay clear of floating Naiad.

QUESTION 2:

Factors which may have affected the diminished growth pattern in the Southern Naiad this summer include:

1. Very late spring which reduced water temperatures at plant level.

2. Record high water levels from spring and early summer rains.

Yea Nay

3. Lower light transmissions in shallow bays due to heavy runoff conditions.

Yea Nay

4. Unanticipated blind luck.

QUESTION 3:

TLA & UW Trout Lake Research Station are participating in an ongoing study of our Naiad problem to discover the "triggers" to Southern Naiad's explosive growth.

AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES MONITORING RACE:

QUESTION 1:

TLA's Clean Boats Clean Waters (CBCW) program worked to the end of September to protect our watershed from the entry of new and aggressive invasive species.

Yea Nay

QUESTION 2:

While as of this writing the final numbers are not in, it appears that this summer's CBCW effort was very similar to last years, with roughly 5,800 boats inspected and 8,000+/- lake visitors educated on the elements of good lake stewardship.

Yea Nay

QUESTION 3:

Again in 2014, the Sentinels Lake Monitoring group surveyed the entire watershed twice during the summer season, looking for both established and new areas of EWM infestation.

Yea Nay

QUESTION 4:

The Sentinels data collection was accomplished with the use of new Garmin GPS hand-held data collectors, purchased for each of the Sentinels 17 teams in the spring. The data collected was the most accurate data ever collected by the Sentinels and simplified the process significantly.

FISHERY INITIATIVE RACE:

QUESTION 1:

Tomahawk's ongoing every other year Walleye and Musky stocking program continued to add significant numbers of both "extended growth" Walleyes (7-8") and muskys (9 inches +/-) to the Tomahawk Lake Watershed in 2014.

QUESTION 2:

WDNR stocked 36,246 extended growth Walleyes and 3,755 Muskys into Tomahawk and Little Lake Tomahawk in early September.

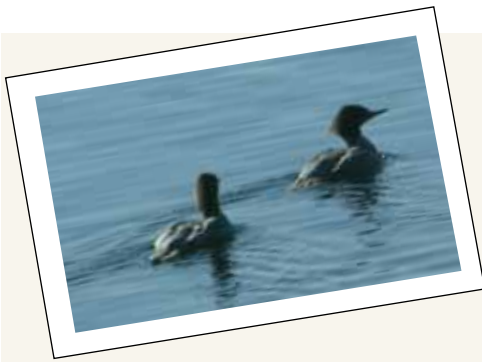

The Large and Small Mouth Bass fishing remained just unbelievable this past summer and because of their high population, every TLA member should commit to eating one Bass caught from our watershed at least once a week.

Why these trends are happening can be answered in several ways:

1. The monitoring organizations (Sentinels & the scientific surveys taken over the course of each summer) have become increasingly accurate in the data collection which identifies the locations of EWM infestation.
2. The continued refinement of pre-treatment data collection which identifies exactly when the chemical application should be made.
3. The efficiency of our Hydraulic Conveyor System (HCS) to remove early growth of EWM from sites in the lake bed before they become large and/or dense.
4. The effectiveness of the actual chemical treatment due to correct dosage which removes the EWM, but leaves the other native plants unaffected.



Other factors...

Other factors which also have affected these trends include the lateness of the

spring, the water temperature at plant depth (8-10 feet down) when the chemical application is made, and the water levels in the lake throughout the summer. All of these elements affect just how well the EWM plants will take up the aquatic herbicide, and as a result, maximize the degree of control that the application will have. Taking all of these things into consideration, we have been "on a roll" these past four years.

A word of caution

However... virtually all of the factors noted above have gone our way. Many of them can go against us as well; particularly those that we don't control. We could have an early spring and as a result higher water temperatures throughout the summer. The lake levels could drop significantly and water clarity could be affected. All we can do as an organization is to focus on the things that we can control.

Thank you to all of the Sentinels and to those who keep us informed as to EWM locations that they see in the lake. You are our "eyes" in the lake!

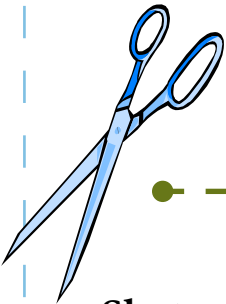
