Sunny Skies With A Chance Of Tornados

LETTER FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, NED GREEDY

If someone asked in the spring for a Summer 2016 forecast, what they might have received is "sunny skies with a chance of tornadoes." There is no doubt that if you had the opportunity to spend any time here in the northwoods this summer that you can see the humor in that statement! Tomahawk Lake residents and visitors alike had many opportunities to enjoy the "sunny skies" of summer over the course of the three months of the summer season. That sunny summer season was punctuated, however, by four severe thunderstorms that provided a great deal of excitement and, unfortunately, a good deal of storm damage to the Lakeland area.

"Sunny skies with a chance of tornadoes" might also be a good description of the way that the summer progressed for the Tomahawk Lake Association (TLA). As an organization, we certainly had a number of sunny skies experiences during the course of the summer. There also have been a few "tornadoes" which have interrupted the otherwise good weather.

"Sunny Days"

The sunny days for the organization have been abundant and our membership and the lake community have enjoyed a number of highlights:

- Following an early ice out and the relatively enjoyable spring season, TLA made its spring chemical herbicide treatment in the last week of May. We treated just short of 26 acres of heavy dense Eurasion Water Milfoil (EWM) in 30 separate locations. The treatments were made in environmental conditions that were conducive to good plant "take up," with favorable wind conditions, warm water and plants that were well developed.
- During the same week, our **Hydraulic Conveyor System** began operations for the summer season, featuring two new divers with excellent diving credentials and great personalities. Following the typical pre-harvesting training sessions, Sarah Albano and Angela Clothier began harvesting EWM in the first week of June. They set a **new** seasonal EWM harvesting record of 26,653 lbs. of drained EWM in one season, eclipsing the old record set by the

Chris Bauer and Ben Brown team of 24,764 lbs. (2015) by 1,889 lbs. Awesome job!

- · Also in June, Bill and Nanette Schwantes and the TLA hosted the fourth annual TLA Wine & **Cheese Tasting and Silent Auction.** This popular annual event was well attended and contributed a net profit of \$4,450 toward our organizations funding needs. A special thanks to the Schwantes for opening their home to host this fun event.
- On the Saturday before the Fourth of July, Peg & Tuck Mallery and Kathy & Pat Daly along with "The Hermit," hosted the 2016 version of the Hermit Island Swim Challenge. This year's challenge featured 41 swimmers and paddlers, along with roughly 50 or so observers and 40+ volunteers. The challenge featured a kid's race (including kid's dogs) and also included kayakers and canoe paddlers for the first time. The weather conditions were ideal for the first time in the event's history. Everyone who participated in this event had a wonderful time and between T-shirt sales, donations and swim challenge buoy sponsorships nearly \$9,200 of net profit was added to the organization's coffers. Many thanks go out to "The Hermit!"
- · In August, TLA members fielded an entry into the Howard Young Foundation's **Dragon Boat Races** on Lake Minocqua. While TLA was not directly involved as a sponsor, 19 people from its membership participated and raised a total of \$8,825 for the Howard Young Foundation. This figure was matched by Ministry Health Care, so the **total** contribution by the TLA Water Bugs amounted to \$17,650. Way to go Team Bugs!
- The second TLA Comprehensive Lake Management Plan (CLMP) was accepted by the Wisconsin DNR and was put into effect in the spring of 2016. A CLMP is needed every five years to help the TLA and WDNR proceed in the right direction to maintain a healthy and well-

balanced approach to protecting the Tomahawk Lake System. A **new initiative** in the plan focuses on Shoreland Restoration and **Storm Water Control**. A great deal of work was done over the course of the spring and summer by a number of dedicated TLA members and local governmental support people. This team, led by board member lim Kavemeier, has developed an initiative to help Tomahawk Lake Shoreland owners better manage the natural health of their shorelines—benefiting not only the shoreline owner, but lake users as well. You will find out more about this initiative I in this newsletter, but a "job well done" goes out to this team.

· Kris Hunt has headed up the development of a **Welcome Packet** to be given to new property

purchasers as they take possession of their new homes on the shores of Tomahawk Lake. The packet gives them a wealth of information regarding the community that they are joining and also about the goals and initiatives undertaken by the TLA. Working with both TLA membership and local realtors and businesses, this welcome packet will be of great value to

families beginning their history on the shores of Tomahawk Lake.

"Tornados" (plus a few cloudy days)

• On the Friday prior to the Fourth of July, a **relatively rare, severe thunderstorm** spread over the northwoods. At about 4:30 p.m., the skies to the west darkened and grew black as the gust front of this storm edged its way across Tomahawk Lake. Jon and Kris Hunt watched the progression of this storm from their home on the

eastern shore of the lake. As the storm progressed across the lake, Jon said that it looked like a solid wall of water as it approached the eastern shoreline. Others said it reminded them of pictures that they had seen of huge sandstorms as they approach and cover towns in the desert. The leading edge of this storm held winds in excess of 75 miles per hour, and had far-reaching and disastrous effects on the lands that it overran. Tens of thousands of Lakeland residents lost electric power which was not restored until after the weekend. Thousands of mature oak, pine. and poplar trees were broken off and uprooted throughout the area. One shoreline owner on the east side of Tomahawk Lake lost 40+ mature trees from his



shoreline. Forest lands adjacent to the southwest shoreline of the lake suffered heavy losses of oldgrowth mature oak trees which either broke off at their tops or were uprooted. The island city of Minocqua lost many stately pine trees in Torpy Park in the storm, and the property damages across the northwoods ran into the hundreds of thousands of dollars. Two weeks later, a second

storm rolled through producing similar results north of Minocqua in the Boulder Junction area.

All told there were four major severe thunderstorms which rolled through the Minocqua area this summer.

- The results of our spring chemical treatment came in mixed in their effectiveness. Overall the percentage of milfoil plants removed within the 30 polygons that we treated, came to about 52 percent of the original plants. These results can be attributed to the small size of our average polygon being about 8/10ths of an acre each. Systemic herbicides require 24 to 36 hours of exposure to be most effective, and the amount of time that our chemical application stayed on these small polygons was no doubt shorter than the time required to be most effective. Beginning in 2017, we will be treating small polygons (less than 5 acres) with a contact type herbicide which are much faster acting in areas that are smaller.
- A future cloud looming on our horizon for the **2017 chemical treatments** is that with the new protocols for contact herbicide use in spot treatment applications (less than 5 acres) call for the use of herbicides which cost significantly more than the 2,4-D systemic herbicide that we have used in past years. While we have yet to receive a cost per acre estimate from our herbicide applicator for the use of these new chemicals, he has indicated that the cost per acre could be as much as twice the current cost per acre for 2,4-D. At the time of this writing, I am in the midst of completing the survey for next year's chemical treatment and have not established the total number of acres which we will be treating. I would, however, anticipate significantly higher treatment costs for next spring.

As we approach 2017, it is **more important** than ever that each property owner on the shores of the Tomahawk Lake watershed take their full responsibility for the stewardship of our lakes. Considering what is at stake, being a member of the Tomahawk Lake Association is essential to the health and well-being of our watershed. Within this newsletter you will find the 2016 Fair Share Membership application. Please, Please, Please! Join our association. It is the only organization that is diligently working to protect and enhance the quality of our waters and the character of our shorelines. As always, your grandchildren will love you for it!

designated as **Outstanding Water Resource Waters** (ORWs) by the DNR. Of Wisconsin's 15,000 lakes and impoundments, only 97 are designated ORWs.

The watershed, the land area that drains into a body of water, for Tomahawk Lake System is key to preserving water quality. Residential land uses provide the best opportunity to maintain water quality, because they have high potential of nutrient rich runoff and sediment entering the lake. Lawns are shallow rooted, provide little wildlife habitat, need frequent maintenance and are often over-fertilized.

These factors can lead to shoreline erosion and lake sedimentation, nutrient rich runoff, increased algae blooms, excessive aquatic plant growth, loss of wildlife habitat, and an increase in nuisance animals such as Canada geese and muskrats.

Practices such as rain gardens, shoreline buffers, and other

methods to capture and infiltrate runoff can be **used** to protect Tomahawk

A natural/restored shoreland:

- Sustains fish and wildlife populations and protects the water quality of the entire lake.
- · Acts as a buffer zone for deep-rooted native vegetation intercepting nutrients and reducing runoff, erosion, and sedimentation.
- **Provides food and shelter** for ducks, songbirds, and other animals, while reducing problems caused by Canada geese and burrowing muskrats.
 - Provides easy access to and from the water for amphibians, turtles, and dragonflies. Plants growing in and near the water are critical for wildlife and fish habitat.
 - Provides branches to shade and cool shoreline water. provides fallen insects for fish, and perches for fishing birds, with fallen trees providing habitat structure for fish.
 - **Can reduce** the energy of wave action to minimize shoreland erosion and help maintain water quality.


