President's Letter

Dear Friends, Neighbors and TLA community,

The seasons are changing once again in the Northwoods. There was ice on our pond this morning and multiple opportunities for snow in the 10-day forecast. I know for our family and community, the past several months have not gone the way we would have hoped and have been filled with uncertainty and anxiety on multiple fronts. I suspect for many of you, your summer plans may not have been exactly as you planned, but from our vantage point on our deck overlooking the lake, it looked like many of you had the opportunity to enjoy all that Tomahawk Lake has to offer. I hope that your time spent on the lake provided a reprieve from all that 2020 seems to be throwing at us.

Looking forward, there are some big changes on the horizon for TLA. First, after more than a decade of dedicated service, Ned Greedy will be stepping down as Executive Director and begin enjoying life on Tomahawk Lake during the summer as a newly retired resident. TLA is forever indebted to Ned. We have been able to do more with Ned's leadership and creative problem solving than many folks realize. As an example, Ned designed one of the first hydraulic conveyor system boats for TLA in the state of Wisconsin and we operate those boats for a little less than \$40k a year. There are several firms now that operate these boats on a contract service basis and would charge TLA in excess of \$200k/yr if we contracted with them instead of relying on Ned's expertise. If and when you see Ned, please give him a well-deserved congratulations and thanks for all that he has done for us.

During this transition, we will be dividing out some of Ned's responsibilities to other board members and I will be temporarily taking on many of his administrative duties as we determine our approach moving forward. Long-term, we envision hiring a new executive director, but are using this opportunity to reimagine what that position could look like and ensure that we have identified the critical skillsets the future individual needs

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

prior to beginning a search for a new executive director. I also recently completed a bidding process with several environmental consulting firms, and we are excited to announce that we will begin working with Onterra Consulting who will take over Ned's grant writing and monitoring responsibilities. Onterra has extensive experience working on the Minocqua Chain. Onterra is currently working with both Mid Lake and Minocqua lake associations. We are in the process right now of submitting grants to update our aquatic plant management plan and continue our whole lake monitoring of Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM). Please look for more info in the spring newsletter on our plans to involve all of you in deciding how we manage EWM in our lake.

As many of you know, we saw an aggressive expansion and growth of EWM in our lake this summer. This was due in large part to the hot, wet weather we experienced which provide great conditions for aggressive plant growth (both natives and invasive species). We were not able to do as

much as we wanted to manage EWM due to a lack of funding from the DNR. Nevertheless, we were able to successfully complete a trial mowing harvest of EWM. We also removed in excess of 26,000 lbs. of EWM from nearly 80 locations with our HCS boat. Given the success of our harvester trial, we are seeking approval from the Wisconsin DNR to harvest approximately 100 acres of EWM from large dense beds across the entire lake (see map). We also plan to operate the HCS boat again this summer and have it focus on removing EWM in and around docks, while relying on the harvester to remove EWM in the larger dense beds. It is important to remember though that our HCS boats can only remove EWM and there are often a lot of native plants growing around our docks that we are not permitted to remove. If you want to remove other plants around your dock, you can do that yourself with a weed razor or contract with local firms like Aquatic Plant Management.

One of the most important things that we can do—as lakeshore residents and property owners to protect our lake and ensure future generations can experience the lake in the same way we do—is to implement best practices

along our shoreline. These include simple things like no-mow buffers, erosion and runoff mitigation, and native plantings. The single largest source of anthropogenic nutrients and sediment to Tomahawk Lake is from our lawns! Please have a close read of Jim's column (on page 5) and look for more information in the spring newsletter as we work to develop a more holistic approach to preserving and protecting our lake.

Finally, I want to extend a huge thank you to all of you that have and continue to support TLA and all that we do. TLA wouldn't exist without your support. If you haven't contributed to TLA this year, please consider joining TLA and supporting our mission to preserve and protect Tomahawk Lake. Farewell from Our Executive Director

Dear friends,

The fall newsletter article that you are reading today will be the last TLA news article that you will read posted by me. On August 1, I informed the TLA Board of Directors that I would be retiring effective January 1 of 2021. This upcoming January will be my 71st year on this good Earth, and as I am entering middle age (remember that 70 is the new 40) I have a few things that I would like to do in my next few years that will require more of my time. I have thoroughly enjoyed the past 13 years as a Board Member and as Executive Director of the Tomahawk Lake Association. I have made so many wonderful and dedicated friends who have supported TLA and by extension me. I will always appreciate those friendships.

Without a doubt, the subject matter of the majority of my newsletters has been our trials in controlling aquatic invasive species, and in particular Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM.) Over the years we have had some successes in controlling the areas of heavy dense EWM, but we have more recently experienced some severe setbacks. Eurasian Water Milfoil has proven itself to be a tenacious adversary, which when given an inch will quickly take a mile.

In future years, starting now, TLA will have to rely on many entities to regain control of the EWM infestation in Tomahawk Lake:

Membership!!! Expansion is critical! We will have little to no effect if only 50% of our shoreline owners take any responsibility for the watershed. In my opinion, that means face to face membership drives.

Individual shoreline owners need to step up and take concrete actions to expand Shoreland best practices on their individual properties.

Volunteers Not just Board of Directors, but more importantly midlevel managers and boots on the ground volunteers for our initiatives.

We suffer from too many chiefs and not enough Indians!

Support of Townships, Oneida County and Area Businesses. We need to tell them our story,

tell them our plan, and finally and perhaps most importantly we need to ASK! for their help. We do this with the towns and we need to do it every place else.

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Over the years, we have viewed the WDNR as our patrons rather than a government service provider who supports the citizenry. I don't mean that we look at them as an adversary, and we certainly want to meet requirements for cost sharing grants which greatly aid our efforts in controlling aquatic invasive species. But in my opinion, we need to utilize our state representatives when we believe that we are not being supported appropriately in Madison. In 2016, our local lakes manager informed us that we are a "second-tier" grant qualifier. Somehow, in some way we need to change that attitude/ perception.

Expansion of the "Toolbox" Thinking outside of the box!

In 2008, four TLA members met in Blueberry Bay to brainstorm and test ideas about harvesting Eurasian Water Milfoil utilizing divers and suction removal. Out of that meeting was born the concept of the Hydraulic Conveyor System (HCS), which we developed and placed into service. Now known as "Diver Assisted Suction Harvesting (DASH boats for short) this concept continues to operate throughout the state as a means of control of aquatic invasive species and in particular EWM. That was a time when TLA thought "out-of-the-box" to expand the number of tools in our EWM control toolbox.

It's past time that the Tomahawk Lake Association put major efforts into "restocking" the toolbox. In my opinion (this is my last newsletter so I get to state my opinion) TLA needs to examine every opportunity to reduce the EWM infestation in our watershed:

- Mechanically harvesting (mowing) in some areas.
- The judicious use of chemical herbicides (especially ProCellaCOR) which have proven greatly successful in the vast number of lakes where they have been used. Retest if necessary, but start today!
- Hands-on EWM hand pulling seminars to teach our shorelines owners how to reduce the effects of EWM at their own shoreline sites.
- Continuing to offer the use of TLA's "weed razor" to members to reduce nuisance weeds around their docs.
- **Expand Fund Raising events** to raise money to overcome grant shortfalls.
- Develop a "business solicitation model" to aggressively promote business support for TLA's efforts. Recognize their support through window stickers and newspaper ads.
- Maximize the use of the Hydraulic Conveyor System to assist shoreline members in removing nuisance plants from their dock areas and asking for donations to support these efforts. Shoreline members are paying outside companies to provide this service on Tomahawk Lake.
- Assign TLA board members areas around the lake to meet face-to-face with non-member shoreline owners, asking for their support through membership as a Fair Share donation. This should be a requirement of all board members.

Finally, I want to say thank you to all those folks who have supported the Tomahawk Lake Association over

the years through their continued membership and more importantly their efforts on the behalf of our watershed. In particular, certain families around the lake have been the stalwarts of TLA for many years, and I appreciate each and every one of them: Rybski, Mallery, Oppenheim, Nicholson, Kavemeier, Shain, Michels, Thompson, Bloom


I know that I've left some families out that deserve recognition, but when you are 70 sometimes you forget.

What is Tomahawk Lake Proud?

I wrote an article for the TLA fall 2018 newsletter entitled "Tomahawk Lake Proud." The essence of the article is that we can be **proud** to be on a lake with pristine water quality, natural beauty, varied fisheries and wildlife habitat, and participate in a variety of water-based activities. It is a fun, scenic place on which to live and recreate. The article stated with pride comes responsibility. The responsibility to insure our shoreland maintenance activities protect the water quality, scenery, and wildlife of Tomahawk Lake. By doing this future generations of shoreland owners will, as we do, enjoy Tomahawk Lake. I think the word is pass it on. Put simply, what kind of lake do we want to leave to our children and their children?

What is the Shoreland **Stewards Program?**

So, I will bet you are wondering what is the link between "Tomahawk Lake Proud" and the "Shoreland Stewards Program?" The Shoreland Stewards Program contains information on and action steps shoreland owners can take to keep us "Tomahawk Lake Proud." Go to www.tomahawklake.org/ shoreland-stewards-program.

What of interest is on the TLA Shoreland Stewards website?

 Shoreland and Stormwater **GIS Mapping and Planning** project New on the website is a three-part report of the recently completed Shoreland and Stormwater GIS Mapping and Planning project. The project summary can be found on the TLA home page. It is a quick read and informs the Tomahawk Lake community of existing critical habitat features, shoreland conditions and their importance for the health of Tomahawk Lake.

Two companion reports can **be found** within the Shoreland Stewards website page. The report entitled Assessing the State of Tomahawk Lake's Shorelands 2020 identifies properties that have buffer conditions in need of improvement, have potential erosion and run-off issues, and are near shoreland areas of high ecological value (e.g. Critical Habitat). The report entitled Getting to Know Tomahawk Lake's Special Places identifies and maps 39 critical habitat areas and the shoreland condition of properties in close proximity to the critical habitat areas. Management recommendations for the critical habitats are included in the report.

I strongly encourage you to take a look at the reports, learn about your property and important critical habitat areas in Tomahawk Lake. It is really interesting information and beneficial to all lake users.

Rate Your Shoreland survey Although not new, the survey provides shoreland owners with a method to evaluate their current shoreland management practices. It also provides information on and recognition for best shoreland management practices. Implementation of the suggested shoreland best management practices protects your property investment.

• Technical assistance

Experience has shown that shoreland owners interested in protecting shoreland property by improving shoreland habitat, controlling drainage and/or preventing erosion, often feel more comfortable retaining professional assistance to identify and then follow through with implementing shoreland best management practices. Watch for information on a new and improved technical assistance program in 2021.

• New for 2021 will be a recognition program to celebrate properties exhibiting good shoreland management practices.
